Chapter 36 - Ariovistus Makes An Arrogant Reply To Caesar's Demands

- According to Ariovistus, the right of war is that they who had conquered should govern those whom they had conquered in what manner they pleased.

- 58 BC Ambassadors from the Aedui and the Treviri come to Caesar with great alerts.
- The Aedui complains that the Harudes are ravaging their territories and preventing the Aedui to gain peace from Ariovistus, even when they give him hostages.
- The Treviri states that a hundred cantons of the Suebi are encamped on the banks of the Rhine River, and they are attempting to cross it under the command of the brothers, Nasua and Cimberius.
- Caesar fears that the new band of Suebi will unite with Ariovistus' troops, making Ariovistus' army more powerful, so he marches to Ariovistus with his troops and forces.

Chapter 38 - Caesar Seizes Vesontio (Besancon)
